School Renovation

The centre stage of the renovation is definitely our canteen. It has been transformed to a multi-lecture theatre. It will uphold its function as a canteen and is open to all schoolmates. But with the installation of airconditioners, projectors and screens, it will be used as a venue for special



indoor activities as well. Activities such as lectures, talks, and even performances can be conducted with the special design. There are also shelves and cabinets as storage spaces for different departments of our school.

Since the opening of the school, many students have spent their time after school in the theatre, including some junior form students. They enjoy using the room as a place for revision and communication, particularly enjoying the new tables and chairs. Some even joked they might break the glass surrounding the theatre! 

Interview with a new teacher—Ms. Dian Tai Nga Yan

This year, LKKC welcomes four new teachers, including Miss Tai Nga Yan Dian, who teaches F.3A, F.4C and F. 5D English. Unlike the other teachers, she prefers students calling her Miss Dian instead of Miss Tai. She explains that calling teachers by their surname seems distant, but calling them by their given names is a friendlier approach taken by children, especially kindergarten kids, as in the Western countries. So, by calling her given name, she can always remember that we are still adorable children!

Miss Dian studied a combined degree with English and Education as her major at university. She didn't expect to be a teacher at the very beginning but after a few years of teaching, she started to enjoy it as she treasures the relationship with students. She explains that the students in the former school she worked in had a less hectic life than here, so she spent a lot of time having lunch with them, and chatting with them about their lives and personal matters, while the students would call her 'mom'. She also thinks that teaching teens can keep oneself young and updated. So after experiencing the enjoyable teaching life, she decided to choose it as her career.

As an English teacher, Miss Dian thinks that English, compared to other languages such as Cantonese, enables her to express herself the most comfortably, so she wants to share this feeling with her students who are experiencing a stage where they start to find their own identity, thus providing a channel for them to express and explore themselves.

She is now in LKKC because she wanted a change of environment after 6 years of teaching in the last school she worked in. LKKC appeals to her because of the diligent, high-achieving students. Generally, she thinks that our students are good and true, especially when compared to her former students, who live in Kowloon. She is quite surprised to see such a difference across the region, and she is still figuring out the reason why. She also appreciates that the senior form students who have high English proficiency and large potential, and thinks that the F3 students are adorable and willing to learn.

Miss Dian has a few tips and advice for our students in learning English. She wants our students to find the true reason for studying English, because it's not only for the DSE, but also for expressing our own and for our future lives. She says that learning English is like a journey to the moon; once you have achieved a high proficiency in this language, you will find that you can interpret the world around you in a different angle because learning a new language provides you with a whole new perspective in your world view. Therefore, she thinks that English teachers are more liberal and have a more interesting perspective when discussing different topics. She also thinks that successful students are good readers and active participants, so she suggests learn through reading and join exchange programmes.



Aside from her teaching and learning, Miss Dian enjoys reading, watching American and British TV programs, baking and travelling. She also reveals that she used to do oil painting, and she likes day-dreaming, which she deems to be healthy!
