Interviewing a new teacher: Miss Mak Cheuk Yin

Q: As an alumnus, how do you feel going back to LKKC again? Are there any changes? Miss Mak: Of course, I am very happy to come back here again. Lots of teachers who taught me before are still here, which makes me feel welcomed. Meanwhile, the changes are also huge, because there wasn't a lot of IT stuff a few years ago, but all the students in Form 1 and 2 now have a tablet for learning. Senior students can also borrow tablets from school.

Q: Why did you choose to become a teacher?

Miss Mak: First of all, I like VA very much, and I hope to bring the joy of painting and creating to every student. Whether I am studying VA in LKKC or studying or creating art in university, I think that art is a joyful thing. Therefore, I hope everyone in my class will enjoy doing Arts. Also, I was inspired by Miss Chan who made me fall in love with Arts. She invited me to study Visual Arts, and I liked it very much. At the time when I was teaching in a college, I tried different teaching methods. I felt that I was quite suitable to teach, therefore I decided to become a VA teacher.

Q: Why did you choose to teach in LKKC?

Miss Mak: I didn't expect to come back for teaching at the beginning, but I met some high school students during my internship here last year to see how they have grown. Luckily, the school needed another teacher, because Miss Chan went to study for a year. So now I'm here.

Q: Have you ever encountered any difficulties in teaching? Miss Mak: The difficulty that I encountered is that my students are relatively passive and they do not respond to my questions actively. I will encourage them to be proactive. Q: Can you share your most memorable experience in LKKC?

Miss Mak: Well... the wall outside the school was painted by my classmates, and there are some unforgettable memories. As the wall was large, we painted it for a few months or so. 
<u>Interviewing</u> a new teacher -Mr Cheung Yin Chun

L: Lau Hei Tsz C: New teacher Mr Cheung

L: Hi, Mr Cheung. Thank you for today's interview. Let's start with an easier question: which levels and subjects are you teaching?

C: I am teaching Chinese language but there's no class for me to teach. I focus on the Form one homework class.



C: It's a good question. My secondary school teacher influenced me to be a teacher because of their passion. So this is the main reason why I want to be a teacher.

L: As you know, Covid-19 has made many teachers resign from their jobs. What is your motivation to still become a teacher?

C: I think education is a necessity. I want students to acquire more knowledge and to make the society more modern. Also, I would like students to learn to be independent and know what they want to do for themselves, instead of people telling them what to do, which is a lifelong education.



- L: Have you taught in any other schools before teaching in LKKC? Why did you choose this school?
- C: Maybe it's because LKKC is in Tuen Mun and I live in Tuen Mun. It's not too far for me. Also, LKKC gave me the position of a teacher assistant.
- L: Oh I see. So can you share how you overcame difficulties you met during the Covid-19?
- C: I think it is when I was still studying at university during the Covid-19 pandemic that I used zoom to study and do other things such as group projects and meet with my professors. There were difficulties that I needed to overcome but all I had to do was to be more hard-working because it was not face-to-face. You have to ask questions immediately so you need to prepare a lot of things when you study, such as potential technical problems or study problems. I had to be hard-working to control myself.
- L: Because of Covid-19, many of our students still feel stressed about their academic results and start to hate studying. Do you have any advice for them and inspire them?
- C: Maybe they don't like studying whether there is Covid-19 or not. True, it may not be as interesting compared to playing or playing sports. They are stressed because they just study at home or they cannot play with their friends and the Form Six students are going to have DSE. The society tells them they need to study no matter what. So I think they need to think more about the purpose of studying. It's not for their parents or the society, but for themselves. The knowledge you gain depends on your own effort and your purpose.
- L: Here is the last question. Do you have any expectations for our students?
- C: First of all, it is to be hard-working. And second of all I would like to share a sentence I learnt in my secondary school in Chinese: "成就自己 成就他人." "self-actualization—how would you like to choose a form cultivating altruism?" This is important when you grow up. Also, I think the job of teachers is to inspire others too and it gives you a chance to show your talents or to make you have more experience to face the results no matter good or bad. My English teacher in secondary school said that no one would help you if you didn't want to help yourself. You will gain from the hard work, and ask more of the teachers when you face difficulties. They will help you.
- L: Thank you again for this interview, Mr Cheung. I hope our schoolmates know more about you now.

Interviewing a new teacher —Ms. Chan Po Yan

Q: Let's start from the beginning of your career. What inspired you to be an English teacher?

A: I have come across a lot of inspiring people in my life, including my uncle and auntie, who are retired English teachers. When I was in secondary school, they already saw the potential in me that I couldn't see at that time. They inspired me to eventually be an English teacher.

Q: I see. Shall we move on to another topic? Why did you choose to teach in LKKC?

A: I am a newbie to schools in Tuen Mun. I chose this school because I know that LKKC students are amiable and well-disciplined. On the other hand, I would like to step out of my comfort zone to teach different types of schools.

Q: Do LKKC facilities or students meet your expectation?

A: My first impression of LKKC students is that they are eager to learn. Indeed, being open to new knowledge is the first and foremost attitude to be better. Other interesting things about LKKC will be left for my journey to discover down the road.

Q: Recently, not only is academic stress faced by students a concern, the pressure of teachers is also put into the public's spotlight. How do you deal with pressure, no matter where it comes from?
